#### Message from Father Loomis



"The price of our salvation is offered to you. We shall be set free at once if you consent. In the eternal Word of God we all came to be, and behold, we die. In your brief response we are to be remade in order to be recalled to life... This

is what the whole earth

Dear Friends,

waits for, prostrate at your feet. It is right in doing so, for on your word depends comfort for the wretched, ransom for the captive, freedom for the condemned, indeed, salvation for all the sons of Adam, the whole of your race." With these words, St. Bernard of Clairvaux redramatizes the moment God asked Mary to become the mother of the Savior in the famous scene we call the Annunciation. The entire reflection lives in the silence between the angel Gabriel's announcement and Mary's response, when for a brief moment the entire future of mankind and salvation history stood at the crossroad of one humble virgin's generosity. What would happen if Mary said no? The thought of this is terrifying.

And yet, the mystery of our salvation continues to play out in time. Every day God works to bring salvation to every soul, He builds the Kingdom of Heaven in our midst, but always in cooperation with our free will. When we consider the tremendous history of the Catholic Church, or more specifically of Deaf Catholics, the Kingdom is easily seen. The Deaf of Philadelphia with the help of the Archdiocese built vibrant communities, religious education programs, camps, a school, faith formation opportunities, and most importantly, the opportunity to worship our God in the beauty of Deaf language and culture. All of this comes from the hands of our loving God and serves to bring the Good News of our salvation to every person, hearing and Deaf alike, but it comes also because our forebears said "yes" when God called upon their generosity. St. Bernard leads Catholics beautifully into the drama of that one brief moment when the world stood still and waited on Mary's response, and she irrevocably uttered her profound "yes". Now the world waits for you.

Will you build the Kingdom for the next generation? How will you carry the faith forward so that future generations come to know the saving message of the Gospel? This advent, as the Church reflects once more on the mysteries of our salvation, consider your part, because the story isn't finished.

#### Message from Sister Kathleen



Dear Friends,

By the time this arrives in your households, it will be the beginning of the Advent season. The four weeks of preparation before the Solemnity of Christmas. For Catholics a solemnity is a feast day of the highest rank and it commemorates a mystery of our faith. This is so easy to miss or trivialize in today's world that makes

a consumer opportunity out of some of our deepest and most profound traditions and rituals. Sometimes it is good to step out of our everyday business and following the wisdom of the Church, make Advent a time to reorient or redirect ourselves to the way God is present in our lives and in our world. Advent is a great time to do this. Our weekly Vlogs that we will begin again on the First Sunday of Advent can help to do that. I encourage you to choose a practice such as praying with the daily and Sunday Scripture readings (you can find wonderful Catholic daily Mass reading apps and web sites to help you with this practice).

Recently, as the readings at Mass just before Advent pointed to the end of time, there were many references in the Book of Revelation using very symbolic language about heaven with mighty angels and all living creatures worshiping at the throne of the Lamb who seemed to be slain. We know this is a reference to Christ who reigns in heaven. This final book of the bible speaks of the fullness of honor, glory and praise given to him who conquered sin and death through a pure act of love. Soon the scripture readings will lead us to another scene. Some symbolic language is still used to describe this historic event of God becoming one of us through the incarnation of His Son, Jesus born on Christmas day. But, the language and story is one we can understand, the birth of a baby in a simple stable surrounded by Mary, Joseph and the Shepherds. Real life human beings following God's plan and witnessing the dawn of salvation through the birth of a little child. Angels again appear in this story praising God's glory and announcing to the shepherds the good news of Jesus' birth. These angels are described as heavenly host (great numbers of angels who dwell in heaven in the presence of God) who are continually praising God. They are inviting us to join them in this chorus of praise, honor and glory. In a sense, that is our role too in this Christmas story. As the Christmas carol so beautifully expresses: "Come let us adore him." With the shepherds, wise men and angels - "Come let us adore him."

It always strikes me that during Mass we have the opportunity to join with the Angels and Saints in praising God. Let us make this the best Advent and Christmas ever as we take

## Deacon Billy Griffin

Dear Friends,

For the last two months it feels like my internet has been going in and out of service. It was bad enough that we contacted the provider to send someone to come and "fix" the issue. They came and



got everything working. Then – the next day, it wasn't working again. Rebooting the modem seemed to do the trick for a few hours and then it would not work again. For me, it felt like a blessing at that time because I could focus on other things that I needed to do around the house. At the same time, I was constantly reminded of what was not working; this light bulb blew out and I need to special order it but I can't order it because the internet's out. I had the same problem with adjusting temperature because the Wi-Fi is connected to the thermostat. It became easier to not check emails because I knew it would drive me up the wall and make me frustrated trying to access it.

When you are not in a practice of doing simple things, you simply forget how to do it well or become satisfied and think you can live without it. Not checking my emails – meant that people were getting responses from me at a later time or I would find out about events after they have happened. This brought me back to the time when I read CS Lewis' "Screwtape Letters". In the story, the devil would try to tempt the person by basically letting them know that everything was fine with what they were doing. Now since I have practically lived without internet for the past couple of months - my computers were disconnected as I tried to troubleshoot our problem. I knew I could do it - but I didn't like it. Why? I was disconnected from the world and pretty much did what I wanted to, without worrying about the world.

With no internet, I had more time for reflection and prayer and realized that my response to not having internet was probably similar to other experiences we have; such as when people who went to school for a long time have to enter the working world and learn the norms of the working world which are very different from the world of school. Same can be said for those who go to Church. The world may seem to be against you going to Church and will find many ways to distract you from going to Church and practicing your Faith. Prayer is like Wi-Fi as it connects you to God. Without this "Wi-Fi" – I was lost. I mean without God, I am lost. Praying is what keeps me close to God and God's family.

Something I have noticed about my prayer life is that changing where I pray helps me to feel closer to God. As I write this, my Wi-Fi has been pretty stable for the last couple of days, as I changed the location of the modem to a different place (there might have been a loose wire or something where I had it before). The Church is the best modem we can have to connect to God!

Hope to catch you praying with me at Mass sometime soon!


